Our ability to rescue and care for horses in need is limited only by available foster homes and funding. Please consider opening your heart and barn or pasture and foster a horse, as has Misty Elam of Riverton. Misty has fostered two Arabians for us and found it to be a rewarding experience! "I'm so happy to be a part of saving these magnificent creatures," she says proudly.

Fostering is an important learning experience for families, too. The Lumbus family of Draper has thoroughly enjoyed fostering, grooming, and playing Parelli Partnership games with Rusty while he awaits his forever home.

What is involved in fostering a horse? We first like to visit the property where our horse will live (both fosters and adopters), to help ensure safe enclosures, access to water, etc., and even help you make safety improvements to the fencing if needed. We provide all the veterinary and farrier care, including Coggins test, vaccinations and deworming. We also provide hay and help you learn and teach Parelli Natural Horsemanship. You provide shelter and lots of TLC!
